ABOUT the agency

We are a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization that operates residential programs for adults with substance abuse disorders and co-occurring substance abuse and mental health disorders. The organization is governed by a Board of Directors and is licensed and regulated by the New York State Office of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services and the New York State Office of Mental Health.

We offer four levels of community residential service including intensive residential rehabilitation, community residential treatment, supportive living, and supported housing. Each of our programs is part of a total continuum of care, and our residents receive individualized treatment and support services based on their specific circumstances.

Cazenovia Recovery Systems, Inc. is a private not-for-profit corporation whose primary purpose is to provide a comprehensive continuum of substance use and mental health residential treatment services to men and women in recovery. FOREWORD

The previous four years saw a considerable amount of growth for the agency, along with some major accomplishments.

Our residents continued to be our primary focus, and there are countless recovery success stories throughout the agency. Residents reunited with their families, learned the value of contributing to their communities through volunteering, resumed their education, and many found gainful and satisfying employment. The steady expansion of our services certainly played a pivotal role in their recovery.

In 2010, the agency opened Amherst Station Apartments, a modern 24-unit facility designed to meet the growing need for affordable and environmentally-friendly housing. The complex also houses our agency's Administrative Office, and the entire structure was designed to be green and energy-efficient while meeting specifications from the Green Building Council. It was developed in partnership with NYS Homes & Community Renewal; Key Bank; Federal Home Loan Bank (M&T and First Niagara); BRD Construction; Fontanese, Folts, Aubrecht, Ernst Architects, PC; Kirst Commercial Real Estate; and Oxford Consulting.

The next year saw our agency introduce a community residence designed to help Veterans with a substance use disorder. Liberty Hall supports 18 male Veterans in recovery through a partnership with the Batavia Veterans Affairs (VA) Medical Center. The program is licensed by the New York State Office of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services (OASAS) and funded by the VA Homeless Grant and Per Diem Program.

Next, in 2012, Cazenovia Recovery Systems created an event designed to increase awareness of substance use recovery. Recovery Month, which is held in September nationwide and is sponsored by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), served as an inspiration for Cazenovia Recovery's event. The first annual Recovery Day was held on Saturday, September 15, 2012 in McCarthy Park in Buffalo and featured a 3K walk / run, cookout, speaker jams, and other family-friendly activities. Recovery Day continues to celebrate the accomplishments of those in recovery while educating the community on recovery-related issues. It also gives individuals in recovery a chance to appreciate how far they've come in a public and celebratory setting. It has been held during the second weekend in September ever since.

In a further show of support for our nation's Veterans, our agency served as a development partner with Finger Lakes Addictions Counseling and Referral Agency (FLACRA) of Clifton Springs, New York, in the opening of Cadence Square in late 2013. The program was developed for military Veterans who are homeless or at risk of homelessness and has 17 apartments open to eligible male and female Veterans and their dependents. Eight supportive living units and eight community residence units accommodate an additional 26 individuals in one- or two-bedroom settings.

Also in 2013, Cazenovia Recovery collaborated with Horizons Health Services to transfer 40 of their beds into our Supported Housing program. These beds contributed to the continued gradual expansion of our U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Housing Programs, which served a total of 108 individuals in 2013.

By the end of 2010, Cazenovia Recovery Systems had served a total of 514 residents, but by the close of 2013, the number of residents served annually grew to 637, reflecting the increased need for residential services for people in recovery from substance use. This report first features a look ahead to Cazenovia Recovery's upcoming goals and activities, then agency-wide statistics for 2013, and finally, statistics for each of our specific programs.

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LOOKING ahead

While the previous three years brought some remarkable growth to Cazenovia Recovery Systems, 2014 looks to be our most transformative year yet due to unprecedented expansion within the agency thanks to assistance from OASAS, the New York State Office of Mental Health, the Erie County Department of Mental Health, HUD, VA, and Key Bank, our principal investor.

On January 1, 2014, Cazenovia Recovery assumed operations of a Supportive Living program and two Community Residences from another local agency. Overnight, our agency's bed capacity grew from 270 to 349. One community residence, Casa Di Vita, is located on Buffalo's vibrant West Side and is capable of serving 19 women in recovery from substance use. Cazenovia Recovery welcomed the opportunity to develop a specialized trauma-informed program for the women at Casa Di Vita, where we have integrated our experience with women's services and community residential services into one specialized program. Casa Di Vita now allows us to provide an appropriate degree of intensity and structure to meet the specific needs of its women while assisting them to build better lives.

The second Community Residence, Ivy House, which is located on Broadway in Buffalo's East Side, serves men in recovery from substance use. Our agency has a long history of providing community residential services to single men in programs very similar to Ivy House. For instance, we already provide community residential services to 24 men in Cazenovia Manor, 16 men in New Beginnings, and 18 male veterans in Liberty Hall in Batavia, NY. Assuming operations at Ivy House was an easy accomplishment for Cazenovia Recovery.

In addition to the Community Residences, Cazenovia Recovery also assimilated an accompanying Supportive Living program into our already existing program, which increased its capacity from 61 beds in 2013 to 105 beds in 2014. The transition went smoothly, and our agency was permanently awarded the additional Supportive Living beds, along with the Community Residence programs, in May of this year.

In March, we began operations of our Young Adult Housing (YAH) program, which is now one of our Housing Programs funded through HUD. The YAH program serves 20 unaccompanied individuals between the ages of 18-25 who are either homeless or at risk for homelessness and have a history of substance use. Residents receive security deposits, rent, appliances, furniture, and more to help them settle into what is usually their first apartment.

Late 2014 will see the start of our HUD Shelter + Care program, and this will be our first foray into Niagara County. Shelter + Care, which will become one of our Housing Programs, is expected to serve between 12 – 16 men and women per year who have a history of substance use. We look forward to developing long-lasting and effective relationships in Niagara County.

In order to meet the growing demand for our services, Cazenovia Recovery will soon purchase additional office space near Buffalo's world-famous Central Terminal at Fillmore and Paderewski Drive. This location will house our now-expanded Supportive Living staff along with our developing vocational program.

Cazenovia Recovery Systems has an exciting future made possible by committed staff, thriving community supports, a dedicated Board of Directors, and inspirational residents who consistently demonstrate that recovery is possible.



community residences CAZENOVIA MANOR



Community Residence designed to serve individuals with a substance use disorder who are in need of professional support as they make their transition to abstinence and independent living. The program opened in 1986 and recently went through a major renovation in 2008. Located near Fredrick Law Olmsted's Cazenovia Park in South Buffalo, Cazenovia Manor can serve 24 men in recovery from substance use.

As a Community Residence, it provides a natural transition for individuals progressing from a more intensive level of care, such as Turning Point House, into a supportive setting with additional community involvement. Residents are able focus on vocational and educational goals as they advance in their recovery while still requiring a supervised support structure. Further recovery skills are encouraged throughout a resident's stay, along with daily living skills. With an average three-month length of stay, Cazenovia Manor offers a myriad of services to its residents, including individualized service and treatment planning, counseling (both individual and group), case management, vocational services, and more. Program residents receive full support in their mental health and physical well-being as they progress on their individual road to recovery. This program, like all of our Community Residences, is licensed by the New York State Office of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services (OASAS).

LIBERTY HALL



Liberty Hall, which opened in 2010, is Cazenovia Recovery Systems' Community Residence Program designed specifically for male Veterans with a substance use disorder who are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless. Located on the grounds of the Batavia, NY Veterans Affairs Medical Center, the program can serve 18 men in recovery. Our Veterans typically stay at Liberty Hall for six months or more. The program is licensed by OASAS and funded by the U. S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) Homeless Grant and Per Diem Program.

Many military Veterans face numerous challenges upon their return home and on their road to re-adaptation. According to the VA, about 45% of homeless Veterans suffer from mental illness and –with considerable overlap– slightly more than 70% suffer from alcohol or other drug use problems. The National Coalition for Homeless Veterans strongly believes that all programs designed to assist homeless Veterans must focus on helping Veterans reach the point where they can obtain and sustain employment. The most effective programs for homeless and at-risk Veterans are community-based, nonprofit, "Veterans helping Veterans" groups, which include transitional housing that offers the camaraderie of living in structured, substance-free environments with fellow Veterans who are succeeding at bettering themselves. Liberty Hall is one of these programs and thus serves as a critical component to the continuum of care for Veterans in Western New York.

community residences **NEW BEGINNINGS**



New Beginnings is a Community Residence that is capable of serving up to 16 men at one time who are aged 18 years and older with substance use disorders. The program, which is located in the West Side of Buffalo, has served the community for over twenty years and has supported hundreds of residents throughout its history.

Much like Cazenovia Manor and Liberty Hall, New Beginnings is a Community Residence that provides individuals with the opportunity to focus on their recovery while still receiving a certain level of supervised support. Community involvement and independence are encouraged, along with development of daily living skills. Residents are assisted in developing employment skills. educational skills, or both. Many of our residents use their time to focus on the development of personal goals, and so they often volunteer within the community or pursue previously-unattainable educational objectives. Program residents receive full support as they make their transition to abstinence and independent living. New Beginnings, along with each of our programs, offers residents the use of Erie Community College's recreational and fitness facilities, which include a swimming pool, weight room, track, and more. This allows the residents to experience a holistic, whole-body approach to recovery. New Beginnings is licensed by OASAS.

HUD PROGRAMS

HOPE, Supported Housing, Supportive Living II & III



diagnosed with substance use and/or mental health disorders. Emphasis is placed on relapse prevention strategies and daily living skills, along with vocational and educational activities. These programs receive funding from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

The Housing Opportunities Promoting Empowerment (HOPE) Program serves individuals with a substance use

(HOPE) Program serves individuals with a substance use diagnosis who have been homeless for at least one year or who have had four episodes of homelessness in the previous three years. The HOPE Program is capable of serving 14 individuals and is designed to be "Housing First" so that residents receive a stable housing situation and then focus on their recovery from substance use.

Supported Housing, which expanded by 40 beds in 2013, serves individuals with co-occurring disorders of substance use and mental illness. This program also receives funding through the Erie County Department of Mental Health and can serve 40 homeless individuals.

Supported Living II can serve 17 homeless individuals who have a history of substance use and who have also maintained a period of abstinence through completion of a substance use program. Supportive Living II also receives funding through Cazenovia Recovery.

Finally, Supported Living III, which is also funded by the Erie County Department of Mental Health, can serve 20 homeless individuals who have a history of substance use along with a diagnosis of some form of mental illness.



obtaining apartments in Buffalo and nearby communities. The program consists of a variety of one, two, and three-bedroom apartments located in areas specifically chosen by the resident. Cazenovia Recovery also provides services and assistance with relapse prevention, rental subsidies, and more. Residents primarily focus on vocational planning and independent living skills, which help them sustain a stable living environment.

The program is similar to the HUD Housing Programs, though it is funded instead through OASAS and can serve a total of 15 individuals. Residents must have a history of substance use, including prior completion of a substance use treatment program, and be homeless or at risk for homelessness.

TURNING POINT HOUSE



Established in 1990, Turning Point House is an intensive residential rehabilitation facility for men who were unable to achieve long-term recovery in previous attempts. The program, which is located on four acres of wooded rural property in Eden, NY, offers residents a restorative experience within a highly structured environment. With a 21-bed capacity, this program provides 24-hour / 7-days-per-week on-site supervision.

In order for residents to achieve and maintain long-term recovery, the average length of stay for successful treatment completion is six months and is divided into a phased structure that allows each resident to move through the treatment experience at their own individualized and progressive pace. Residents identify personal conflicts and explore their beliefs about life, trauma, and interpersonal relationships while learning to cope with life experiences without relying on substance use. Turning Point House is licensed by OASAS.

SUPPORTIVE LIVING



Supportive Living is a structured program designed to meet the needs of individuals who have achieved a period of abstinence and stability but still need some support with their ongoing recovery goals. The program, which serves both males and females, was one of Cazenovia Recovery's first programs, and our initial Supportive Living apartment opened on Macamley Street in Buffalo in 1989. By the end of 2013, Cazenovia Recovery's Supportive Living program was capable of serving a total of 61 individuals in recovery with an average stay of 6-9 months.

Throughout their stay, residents live in peer-connected apartments located near the agency's Community Residences, which provide Supportive Living residents with additional support whenever needed. A major focus is placed on independence and responsibility for their recovery. Therefore, residents participate in supportive programming designed to help them with their employment, vocational, educational, and self-help goals. Applicants must be at least 18 years of age, have a diagnosis of substance use, and can independently function without 24-hour supervision. This is a self-funded program that receives support from a variety of Social Service Departments from different counties.



VISIONS PLACE



Visions Place is designed for chronically homeless individuals who have severe and persistent mental illnesses along with a substance use disorder. The program, which was opened in 2004, is capable of serving 24 men and women in single rooms and shared community spaces. Program supervision runs 24/7 and provides residents with a safe and nurturing environment which allows them to properly focus on both managing their mental illness and recovery from substance use. Residents achieve housing stability as they learn how to manage the specific symptoms of their mental illness. Program participants also begin to identify the underlying issues that led to their substance use and are educated on the consequences of long-term addiction as they develop personal and vocational skills.

Because of the compelling nature of the program, residents receive a customized treatment plan designed to meet their specific health and recovery needs. An average stay at Visions Place typically runs from six months to two years. Visions Place is licensed by the New York State Office of Mental Health (OMH) and partially funded by both HUD and the Erie County Department of Mental Health.
